Bridging the Gap ...

is a program that finds temporary contacts for newly released treatment facility clients to ease the transition to outside A.A. meetings. You don't need treatment experience to be a temporary contact. Your own experience, strength and hope are most important. Often, this contact is the essential link between treatment and recovery. **Remember, there's nothing temporary about helping someone start a lifetime of sobriety.**

How it Works

A local intergroup, district or area can start by creating a Bridging the Gap committee or appointing a BTG Coordinator. Next is creating a list of A.A. members who volunteer to be temporary contacts. The BTG committee can now inform treatment facilities about the service. Clients are encouraged to contact the BTG committee as they're released, so a BTG volunteer/coordinator can arrange contact with an A.A. member. Most often, A.A. members make direct personal contact with clients. Sometimes, treatment administrators "make the bridge."

Temporary Contact List

It's suggested that contacts have at least one year of continuous sobriety.
